William Cleary's thoughts on prayer really stuck with me. I don't believe that God listens and cares less than our dogs do. Throughout history, God created covenants with our forefathers in faith, "I will take you as my people and I will be your God" (Exodus 6:7). We are made with a spark of the divine within us. But we also have a void within us created by our humanness and we constantly search for God to fill that void.

Within Macrina Wiederkehr's book, *A Tree full of Angels*, there is a chapter called "Feasting at the Table of Daily Life." She compares the events of our daily life to crumbs that we can use to make our daily bread from God. Throughout she speaks of God in one glorious encompassing way, as Love.

Wiederkehr includes her prayers in response to a raging storm, and a call to love; a prayer about childhood memories and one on her own dried up heart. But each moment of prayer is placed before God believing that it will be acknowledged and responded to. God cannot help but be involved. God created us. And being in a relationship with God is the very reason for our life. It is our final end.

Perhaps we can't pinch or sway God. But we can learn from the example Jesus sets for us in the Gospel. He often goes out into the quiet to be alone with his Father to pray. Jesus tells us a parable about a nagging old woman who constantly bothers a judge to rule in her favor. Jesus tries to stress the importance of a relationship with God in many parables. And, St Paul tells us, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. (1Thessalonians 5:17).

The apostles asked Jesus to teach them how to pray. They wanted what Jesus had with Abba, a relationship. Wiederkehr's prayers for the people who left tracks in the sand, prayers about the wonder of people scurrying through malls, and the prayer for her own dried up heart, allowed Wiederkehr to realize that her longing to be in a relationship with God was her first desire. She also realized that God is always there to listen, God does not abandon us. It is the unsteadiness of our human soul that turns away. And, it is always God who calls us back.
